#### **SEMESTER AT A GLANCE**

### Unit 1: Introduction to Adaptation Theory

What we're learning: The theoretical foundations of adaptation studies Key concepts: Fidelity, medium specificity, film language, archetypes Skills focus: Comparative analysis, academic vocabulary, visual literacy

We'll start by building your toolkit for analyzing both literature and film. You'll learn the specialized vocabulary critics use to discuss adaptations and practice identifying what makes each medium unique.

#### Unit 2: Short Stories on Screen

Texts: "All Summer in a Day," "The Lottery," "Three-Ten to Yuma" and their film adaptations
Skills focus: Close reading, mood analysis, thematic interpretation
Creative component: Mood museum creation, social issue connections

Short stories offer perfect case studies for adaptation because their brevity allows us to examine every choice closely. We'll see how filmmakers expand or condense these compact narratives.

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#### **CLASS GOALS**

This course explores the fascinating world of literary adaptation, examining how stories transform as they move from page to screen. We'll dive deep into both the art of storytelling and the craft of filmmaking, developing critical thinking skills that will serve you well beyond high school. Whether you're a bookworm, a film buff, or completely new to both, you'll discover new ways to analyze and appreciate narrative across different mediums.

Throughout this semester, we'll investigate how the same story can be told in dramatically different ways depending on its medium. You'll learn to "read" films with the same critical eye you bring to literature, while also understanding the unique strengths each medium offers storytellers.

#### Unit 3: Young Adult Novel Analysis

Text: The Giver (novel & film)
Skills focus: Character
development, world-building,
dystopian genre conventions
Creative component: Virtual
reality community design
project

Young adult adaptations face unique challenges in translating internal character growth to visual storytelling. We'll explore how filmmakers handle complex themes for teen audiences.

### Unit 4: Classic Literature Adaptations

Text: Pride and Prejudice (novel & film adaptation)
Skills focus: Historical context, social commentary, cultural translation Creative component: "Living History" immersion experience

Classic adaptations must make centuries-old stories relevant to modern audiences. We'll examine how different time periods have reimagined Austen's social critiques.

### Unit 5: Final Adaptation Project

Your choice: Select your own text to adapt from list

Project options Skills focus: Creative application, project management, presentation skills

This is where you demonstrate everything you've learned by creating your own adaptation. You'll choose the format that best showcases your strengths and interests.
